Hay St. Mary's Graveyard

Several months ago an American lady, Margaret Egleston, contacted me to find out about her Hay ancestry. She had done some research and found that she descended from James Davies who lived at Pen-y-maes before 1850. James' descendants were chemists and ran the shop at 7 High Town in Hay which is now Jones' Chemist. In the infamous Armstrong murder case, it was Fred Davies, the chemist, who started off the investigations into Major Herbert Rowse Armstrong suggesting to Dr. Hincks that Major Armstrong had poisoned his son-in-law, Oswald Martin, by putting arsenic in a scone after an invitation to tea. Margaret visited Hay this summer and I showed her around the town and we looked into St. Mary's churchyard to see if we could find the

family graves. Bryn Like's recent book on the memorials was a great help and we located the graves eventually but the job was quite difficult because the graveyard was quite overgrown and only some of the upstanding stones were visible, the flat slabs were covered in moss and brambles. The graveyard has been closed to new burials since about 1870 so very few of the graves at the back of the church are now being cared for. A couple of months ago I saw a lady sitting in front of a gravestone recording the memorial there. I chatted with her and it transpired that she was recording the memorials for the whole graveyard for the Powys Family History Society. She had already done the Brecon Road Cemetery. But her job was very difficult and could only be partially done because of the undergrowth. So after raising the matter with Hay History Group I decided to see if we could assist with clearing the cemetery. A meeting with the churchwardens was arranged and an agreement was made that we could begin. The History Group had recently received a small grant and we have decided that this would be an excellent project to fund, buying tools etc. for the job. When we have completed the project we hope to upload the map of the memorials and the transcriptions to our website. So Margaret's contact via the History Group website started a chain of events that will eventually allow researchers across the world to find their ancestors final resting place in the peaceful setting of St. Mary's graveyard beside the Wye. Llanwrtyd Heritage and Arts Centre

At the end of October we completed our second year of opening (April to

October) during which we also hosted many local Arts & Crafts contributors within our Art Gallery. Displays included not only paintings and craft items and but also workshops illustrating how such work is undertaken.

During the period April – October we attracted 1,700 visitors and we hope to continue this level of interest during 2018.

The new facility for Powys Archives and Information Management was officially opened in Llandrindod Wells on Monday 2 October by the Leader of Powys County Council, Cllr. Rosemarie Harris, marking an investment of £1.6m by the council to safeguard Powys' historic records.

Councillor Harris commented: “I’m very pleased that this project has been finished on time and within budget as we now have a long-term home for these very important items which also, importantly, provides a much better service to our residents and to those who travel from all over the world to access these documents.”

My Dearest Girls: The Letter Book

Six women's lives in a time of war, told through the letters they wrote to one another. Herefordshire Archive and Records Centre Fir Tree Lane, Hereford HR2 6LA. £10 adults; £5 children (suitable for age 12+)

Francesca Millican-Slater creates a brand new piece based on the real letters sent between a group of six Shropshire women between 1917-20.

Against a background of war the women tell each other stories of their everyday life; as farmers, office workers, factory hands, nurses and teachers. There is gossip and hint of scandal, reprimands and reprisals, tales of dancing for royalty, fiances on the frontline and how to feed 100 chickens while on rations.
